Here's a question worth pondering: why are we a church? Our church is 150 years old now, and when something has been around a long time we often fail to ask the "why?" question. It's worth thinking about: what's the "why" behind our existence? If someone were to ask you, knowing you're a part of Hazelwood, "Why does your church exist?" would you be able to give a good answer? As we've been in the Epiphany Process this year, one of the things we've been told is the "what" and "how" need to proceed from the "why." When we're clear on why we're here, then what we're doing and how we do it become a lot easier. If we're not clear on why we're here, then we end up trying to do the same old things without any motivation other than the inertia of the past. Our consultant for the Epiphany Process told me, "Keep chipping away at the 'why."

During September I'm going to be preaching a sermon series on our church's "why." I'm going to use an unlikely source, though, and that's the book of Isaiah. Isaiah's people had to reimagine who they were as God's people after a series of changes and disappointments. I really find Isaiah to be so creative and beautiful in how it offers a revisioning of the people's identity. I wonder if maybe we can learn from their example in how we re-envision how to be church in the new time in which we live. I'll be sharing more about this during worship on Sundays from Sept. 9-30.

Also, as a parallel to the Isaiah theme in my preaching, I'm going to be teaching a study on Isaiah on Wednesday afternoons. If you're curious about Isaiah's poetic prophecy, join me on Wednesdays at 2 p.m. in the Chapel on September 12, 19, 26, and October 3.

Let's start praying and focusing on why we're a church, and I believe the "what" and the "how" will become clear, too.



Evaly's Story

For moms in remote communities in northern Nicaragua, caring for little ones can be a challenge. For example, life here often means that moms give babies solid food too soon. "The reason why we do that is because a lot of us have to leave our children with our neighbors while we go to work in our fields, which are often far away from where the community is. That means that our neighbors aren't able to give them breast milk," she says.

A CWS-supported program in the area is partnering with moms to strategize about how to best overcome these challenges and nourish young children. Evaly says that she now has a better understanding of what to do when a child is malnourished and what foods are best for children at each stage of development.

CROP Hunger Walks are community-wide events sponsored by Church World Service and organized by local congregations, raising funds and awareness to combat hunger at home and around the world. Twenty-five percent of all money raised stays here in Delaware County to support Christian Ministries Food Bank.

Andrea Replogle, a pastor for the local church The Gathering, says, "I would strongly encourage the faith community to come out and see *The Christians*. I believe this is an excellent way to begin a dialogue in the church that wrestles with the places where theology, pride, and relationships intersect in the church. This is an honest yet honoring depiction of the inner workings of a church that shows the importance of knowing what we believe."

Shows are September 21-22 and 28-30 in Muncie Civic's Studio Theatre. Friday and Saturday performances are at 7:30 p.m., with Sunday matinees at 2:30 p.m. Both Sunday matinees will have Talk Back Sessions immediately following, led by local members of the faith community. WHITE RIVER CLEANUP: SATURDAY. SEPTEMBER 15

The White River Cleanup has been responsible for removing over 98,000 pounds of trash and 650+ tires from our beautiful river. It has drawn well over 2,700 volunteers over the years, making it the largest single-day volunteer event in Delaware County. Last year alone brought around 230 volunteers to Westside Park. The White River Cleanup covers close to 12 miles of river from the Old Indiana Steel and Wire Plant all the way to Canoe Country in Daleville.

This annual event happens each September and is a statewide public service event stretching along much of the White River. Many counties including Delaware, Hamilton, Monroe, Madison, and Morgan Counties participate in cleaning up the White River on or near the same date. People come together from all communities to help clean the White River, and thousands of pounds of trash are removed every year, including large amounts of tires.

Volunteers walk the bank, river, and land where possible removing debris from and around the river. When that is not possible, volunteers use canoes to navigate through the water, filling them up along the way with the debris they find.

We request that volunteers pre-register at beautiful muncie.org so we have a headcount for lunch and proper volunteer coverage for each site. Lunch and a water bottle will be provided to all volunteers who attend the event. Attendees are encouraged to dress appropriately by wearing clothes and shoes that can get dirty and wet. Please bring gloves if you have them.
