

I once had a worm farm. Even now, over 35 years later, it's hard to own up to those six words. But, yes, I once had a worm farm. Whenever I start to feel too full of myself, like I'm all that and even a little bit more, I humbly remind myself that at one time I thought the cultivation of a worm colony was a can't-lose idea. I was seven or eight years old, and we lived near a good-sized pond. I enjoyed fishing, and there was the need for bait. I had a container full of dirt, and I went digging in the likely locations, under woodpiles and such, looking for worms. Finding a big night-crawler, I'd toss it in the dirt container. There were visions of a profitable business, selling bait to fishermen. The vision was me setting up a little stand on Saturdays down by the town lake, arriving early with dozens of worms and leaving at the end of the day with fistfuls of cash. I think the only sale I actually made was a dozen to my grandma, who liked to fish, and she probably only gave me fifty cents. After a few weeks the idea of farming worms got old, and the dirt, along with the few worms I kept alive, were tossed back by the woodpile from where they originally came. At the start of the venture, though, someone told me cornmeal sprinkled on the top of the farm would feed the worms. My mom gave me some Quaker cornmeal, and I sprinkled some over the dirt. I tried to return the cornmeal to my mom, but I imagine she thought quickly of me taking it back and forth to a place where worms were being raised, and she said, "Why don't you just keep it."

Paul, when writing to the Corinthian church, reminds them of their humble origins: "... not many of you were wise by human standards, not many were powerful, not many of noble birth. But God chose what is foolish in the world to shame the wise" (1 Cor. 1:26-27). You can count me, with my worm farm, in that group. The thing is, though, even if one is wise, powerful, or from a noble family, the need is the same. We are all drinkers from the one cup of God's goodness, and that makes us all equals. Trade school drop-outs and Noble laureates, white-collared folk and those wearing t-shirts, old-money aristocrats and undocumented immigrants, caviar-eaters and worm farmers—we're all passengers in the same boat in God's kingdom, and there are no first-class or third-class berths on that ship, only those who are glad for their tickets. That means there is no looking up or looking down at one another; the ground is level when you're in line to receive God's abundance. And should you ever find me forgetting that and acting uppity, remind me that you'd like to buy a dozen worms from me.

WHERE: Westside Park, Muncie

This annual event happens each September and is a statewide public service event stretching along much of the White River. Many counties including Delaware, Hamilton, Monroe, Madison, and Morgan Counties participate in cleaning up the White River on or near the same date. People come together from all communities to help clean the White River, and thousands of pounds of trash are removed every year, including large amounts of tires.

Volunteers walk the bank, river, and land where possible removing debris from and around the river. When that is not possible, volunteers use canoes to navigate through the water, filling them up along the way with the debris they find.

Volunteers will need to **pre-register at beautifulmuncie.org** so they have a headcount for lunch and proper volunteer coverage for each site. Lunch will be provided to all volunteers who attend the event and stay until 11 a.m. Attendees are encouraged to dress appropriately by wearing clothes and shoes that can get dirty and wet.
